



Report of the Chair – Senate Transition Meeting

Report of the Chair – Nominations Committee Slates

- All continuing Senators, please review the slates before our next Senate meeting on May 7th.
- We will be holding elections for the next Chair-elect and afterwards distributing a survey for elections of the Senate's elected committees and councils.







- The College of Information Studies (also known as the iSchool) proposes to change its name to the College of Information.
- The College last changed its name in 2001, when it changed from the College of Library and Information Services to the College of Information Studies. Since that time, there has been substantial growth in the mission, research, educational programs, and size of the College.



• Over the last decade, the College has engaged in issues such as technology and policy for digital accessibility, sociotechnical design for providing privacy, co-design of information technology for specific populations including children and older adults, protecting people from mis-and disinformation, and the ethical application of artificial intelligence and machine learning by both the private and public sectors.



 The current name "Information Studies" no longer captures the College's rich set of educational and research activities, particularly the college's applied and practice-centered endeavors.





- Adopting this name would also align the College with the other 53 iSchools in North America, among which "Information" is the most commonly used name.
- The College has socialized the name change with alumni, faculty, staff, students, College Advisory Board, UMD Senior Administration, Deans at UMD, and the UMD Office of Marketing and Communications; the proposal for the name change was met with strong support.





- The proposal was approved by the Senate Programs, Curricula, and Courses Committee at its meeting on March 1, 2024.
- The Program, Curricula, and Courses Committee moves that the proposal to rename the College of Information Studies to the College of Information be approved.







APAS Report: Revision to the Final Exam Provision in the University of Maryland Policy on the Conduct of Undergraduate Courses and Student Grievance Procedure (Senate Document #21-22-11)

In September 2021, the Senate Executive Committee (SEC)
received a proposal regarding the final exam provision in the
policy on the Conduct of Undergraduate Courses and Student
Grievance Procedure.





 The proposal said that the University of Maryland Policy on the Conduct of Undergraduate Courses and Student Grievance Procedure, Policy V-1.00(A), sole reliance on mandatory final exams limits student assessment methods by restricting instructor autonomy to determine which method is best for their course and discipline.





 It suggested a review of the final exam provision in the policy to consider eliminating the mandatory final exam requirement.
 Additionally, the proposal included a suggestion of a 10% limit on the amount of assessments assigned to students during the last week of classes to prevent overburdening students at the end of the semester.





- The APAS committee completed its review of the proposal, submitting its report in May 2023.
- At the September 6th, 2023 Senate meeting, the committee's findings were presented, prompting the Senate to request further clarity in proposed policy revisions.





 Subsequently, the committee began by refining the revised policy language, including clarifications on terms like "the last week of classes."





- The committee also discussed specific types of alternative assessments to ensure the inclusion of various academic degrees' modalities of instruction and assessment.
- Additional examples were added; although the list of examples provided is not exhaustive, the examples will help illustrate the types of end-of-semester assessments considered as alternative assessments.





 It was recognized that more feedback was needed about the overall policy revisions. A special-order presentation was given at the November 1, 2023 Senate meeting, using straw poll questions to gather additional feedback.





- This information helped focus the committee's work on the proposed policy revisions. The poll results indicated strong support for the proposed policy changes including the removal of the mandatory final exam requirement and the need for a limit on assessments due during the last week of classes.
- There were mixed results about the proposed percentage value of a 10% limit on the work due in the last week of classes.





 Based on the Senate's feedback, the committee had extensive deliberations about considering changing the proposed percentage limit and the merits of a 10% limit.





 To better evaluate the percentage limit, additional peer institution policy data was reviewed to examine options of how other institutions address end of semester assessment limitations. The committee also sought feedback from a representative with the Teaching and Learning Transformation Center (TLTC) and from a group of undergraduate students with a variety of majors and years at the university.



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APAS Report: Revision to the Final Exam Provision in the University of Maryland Policy on the Conduct of Undergraduate Courses and Student Grievance Procedure (Senate Document #21-22-11) (Action)

 Key points from this new information was that a 10% limit on work due during the last week of classes is a reasonable amount if a final exam is given. If no final exam is given, projects due in the last week greater than 10% are acceptable, if the project is assigned earlier in the semester.





• In the consideration of the new data, committee members strongly agreed that maintaining the 10% limit on the work due in the last week of classes was important and reasonable. It was also determined that relaxing the 10% limit on projects due in the last week of classes is acceptable if the project is assigned by the end of the 9th week of classes and there is no final exam given.





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APAS Report: Revision to the Final Exam Provision in the University of Maryland Policy on the Conduct of Undergraduate Courses and Student Grievance Procedure (Senate Document #21-22-11) (Action)

 The committee chose the deadline an alternative assessment must be assigned by factoring in the registrar's "Drop Period" end date. This deadline would allow students to make an educated decision about the entirety of the expected workload at the end of the semester.





Based on these discussions the following decision points were used when drafting the proposed policy language:

- Removal of a mandatory final exam requirement if unit level guidelines do not require them
- Any final exams given must be held during finals week.
- A 10% limitation on work due in the last week of classes if a final exam is given.
- If no final exam is given, alternative assessments greater than 10% of the grade may be due during the last week of classes or during finals week so long as it is assigned by the end of the 9th week of classes.



Committee members appreciated the updated proposed policy language because it addresses concerns from the Senate, students, and faculty by allowing faculty the flexibility to determine whether to administer a final exam or an alternative assessment, preventing the overburdening of students in the last week of classes, and avoiding the complexity of the other policy proposal options considered.





The APAS Committee recommends that the proposed revisions to the University of Maryland Policy on the Conduct of Undergraduate Courses and Student Grievance Policy [V-1.00(A)], as shown in the report, be accepted.





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APAS Report: Revision to the Final Exam Provision in the University of Maryland Policy on the Conduct of Undergraduate Courses and Student Grievance Procedure (Senate Document #21-22-11) (Action)

c. There shall be a final examination and/or assessment in every undergraduate

course, unless written permission is granted by the unit head. Final examinations worth more than 10% of the course grade shall be administered during the final examination period when one is established and published by the Office of the University Registrar. Unit-level guidelines may require that specific courses administer final exams. When a final examination period is scheduled, no final examinations shall be administered on Reading Day or during the last week of classes, defined as the final seven calendar days of the semester ending on the "Last day of classes" published in the academic calendar.



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APAS Report: Revision to the Final Exam Provision in the University of Maryland Policy on the Conduct of Undergraduate Courses and Student Grievance Procedure

(Senate Document #21-22-11) (Action)

c. When a final examination is administered during finals week, no exams or alternative assessments worth more than 10% of the course grade may be due or administered during the last week of classes.





c. If a course has no final examination administered during the final examination period, alternative end-of-semester assessments (e.g., term papers, final projects, presentations, performances, lab practicals) worth more than 10% of the course grade may be due during the last week of classes, if detailed expectations for the assessments are provided by the end of the 9th week of classes. Alternatively, these end-of-semester assessments may be due during the time scheduled for the final exam of the course during the final examination period, but they may not be due on Reading Day.





c. Each faculty member shall retain, for one full semester (either fall or spring) after a course is ended, the students' final assessments in the appropriate medium. If a faculty member goes on leave for a semester or longer, or leaves the university, the faculty member shall leave the final assessments and grade records for the course with the department chair, the program director, or the dean of the College or School, as appropriate.

d. Each faculty member shall retain, for one full semester (either fall or spring) after a course is ended, the students' final assessments in the appropriate medium. If a faculty member goes on leave for a semester or longer, or leaves the university, the faculty member shall leave the final assessments and grade records for the course with the department chair, the program director, or the dean of the College or School, as appropriate.





- The discussion board from the previous meeting will be closed for comments the same day (one week prior) that the following board is released.








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How to Navigate to the Discussion Board
