Name Change to Ph.D. in Family Science

The Department of Family Studies (FMST) was renamed the Department of Family Science (FMSC) in Spring 2007. The new name, Family Science, reflects the Department's emphasis on scientific research aimed at helping families improve their health, financial security, and quality of life. With the transformation of the College of Health and Human Performance to a School of Public Health, it is also important to emphasize the centrality of scientific research to our discipline.

Our Department currently offers a very successful Ph.D. program in Family Science, recognized nationally for its "Preparing Future Faculty Program." In FY 2007, the Department had 9 Ph.D. graduates. Four secured tenure track positions (e.g., University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign; University of Maryland at Baltimore; Miami University of Ohio), and others accepted high-level family policy positions in government and non-profit organizations.

We are now requesting to change the name of the Ph.D. in Family Studies to the Ph.D. in Family Science. There are three major reasons for this request. First, the proposed name change is consistent with current directions within our discipline to focus on *family science* in the nomenclature of academic departments, major disciplinary associations, and federal government programs in family science. Almost all similar departments in other institutions, particularly Land Grant institutions with strong programs, offer degrees in *Family Science*. The Chronicle of Higher Education also lists faculty positions within the family discipline under the category of "family sciences." We are now offering a second Ph.D. program in Maternal and Child Health and the name, family science, more closely resembles the names of departments in Schools of Public Health that offer this degree (e.g., Department of Population and Family Health Sciences).

Second, the proposed change clarifies the program's academic focus on scientific research, evaluation, and evidence-based practice aimed at improving family well-being. Third, renaming the graduate program will make the Ph.D. degree consistent with the name of our department.

There will be no costs associated with this name change.
